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Hedgehogs – The Mating Season & Babies!

Hedgehog mating season begins shortly after hibernation, usually late April. They reach sexual maturity in their second year and can breed annually. Courtship is noisy and lengthy, with males circling females, huffing and chuffing—often attracting rival males and sparking confrontations. Strange night time garden noises may well be hedgehogs!

Breeding occurs from April to September, with peak activity in May and June. After a 32-day gestation, most births happen in June or July. Litters average four to five hoglets but can be as many as seven. If disturbed shortly after birth, mothers may abandon or eat their young. Later disturbances may prompt her to move them. At around four weeks old, hoglets begin foraging with their mother and become independent within two to three weeks.

If you suspect hedgehogs are nesting in your garden, avoid disturbing potential sites or using gardening equipment nearby. Support them with shallow bowls of water (not milk) and meaty kitten biscuits. Encouraging neighbours to create "hedgehog highways" between gardens also helps.



A hedgehog seen during daylight may be in trouble. Don't pick it up, observe from a distance and contact your local rescue ASAP for guidance.

Community Speed Watch Update: Monitoring Efforts on Calcot Place Drive and Mill Lane

Over the past few weeks, local volunteers have been helping to keep our roads safer through Community Speed Watch (CSW). Thank you to everyone who stops to chat to the team or shout encouraging words from their cars, but please remember, the team are volunteers. Sessions can only be held within the guidelines of the scheme. More volunteers are welcome to help cover more of the Parish and more times of day. Community Speed Watch is about raising awareness of speeding and improving road safety through education.

Calcot Place Drive: Encouraging Speeds, Concerning Incidents

During a one-hour monitoring session (3.00pm to 4.00pm), on Calcot Place Drive, volunteers observed approximately 65 vehicles. Encouragingly, the typical speed recorded was in the mid-20s (mph). However, the team witnessed three near-miss incidents in that short timeframe. These occurred as cars travelling down the road navigated around parked vehicles without noticing oncoming traffic. Vehicles, with the right of way, were then forced to either swerve into a side road or up the kerb to avoid collision. These incidents highlight that driver awareness is just as important as speed when it comes to safety.

Mill Lane: A Busier, Faster Route

Over the course of one hour (3.00pm to 4.00pm), more than 330 vehicles were observed highlighting how busy this route is. Unfortunately, here, the speeds were notably higher, with some vehicles registering up to 40mph. This is a serious concern. The risk of fatal injury for a pedestrian struck at 40mph is approximately 90%, compared to around 10% at 20mph. These figures, (UK Department for Transport data), underscore the importance of slowing down in residential areas. Remember, children play out on our streets and there are many animals out and about.

News from Calcot School

The children then enjoyed a picnic and traditional games on the school field.

Our year 6 children completed their SATs exams; we are very proud of them all. They also took part in fun activities throughout the week, finishing with the much anticipated SATs water fight! Some of the teachers also joined in!

Did you Know?

Following a recent enquiry from a resident, the Council is pleased to share the answers to the questions as many maybe of wider interest. Here's a summary of two answers (for full details, please visit our website: www.holybrook-pc.gov.uk to view the document).

Solar Panels: Saving money & supporting sustainability

We reported, in the last newsletter, that solar panels will be installed on the Beansheaf Centre. This move helps reduce rising electricity costs and supports our goal of greater environmental sustainability. While the panels won't generate much income, due to an export limit, they will cut on-site energy bills. These savings can then be reinvested into the Centre keeping hire rates affordable, which helps support community groups, and maintenance of the facilities. Reinvestment has real community impact with 9 of the Centre's 25 regular user groups already receiving discounted hire rates, saving between £2.50 and £9.00 per hour. And, despite rising costs elsewhere, the Council has kept rental charges stable since 2022 to ensure the Centre remains accessible.

Funding Facts: CIL vs Precept

The Precept is the portion of council tax allocated to parish councils (£143,357 for 2025/26). It helps fund ongoing operations and services. Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) is different. It's a fund paid by developers to help local areas manage the demands that come with growth such as improving infrastructure, parks or facilities. CIL funds cannot be used for day-to-day running costs but are, instead, earmarked for specific improvement projects across the Parish.

Community Spirit Shines Through After Youth Shelter Fire



We're saddened to report an arson attack on the youth shelter at Holymead recreational ground in early May. While no one was hurt, the shelter was badly damaged and is beyond repair. CCTV footage has been shared with police, who are now investigating.



In a heartening response, local teenagers Faith Murphy and

Chloe Golding, took it upon themselves to clear the site of debris and litter. Their thoughtful, self-driven act has been warmly praised by councillors, who commend their example of responsibility and community spirit.

Plans are underway to replace the shelter with a stronger, more durable structure.
